TRICARE COSTS ARE GOING UP AGAIN IN 2024

Military service members, families and retirees will pay more for Tricare in 2024, with modest increases generally amounting to about 3%.

Costs also went up moderately this year.

The 2024 increases for many using Tricare Prime and Tricare Select will mainly be to their annual enrollment fees and deductibles, with smaller increases in copayments for medical services.

Tricare open enrollment season, which allows members to change their health insurance coverage for the upcoming year, runs from Nov. 13 to Dec. 12. Guard and reserve members, as well as transitioning troops and young adults enrolled in Tricare plans, will also see price increases in 2024.

Tricare costs depend on which Tricare "group" a military member belongs to. A member's Tricare group is determined by when they first entered the military. Group A consists of those who entered service before Jan. 1, 2018, while Group B are those who entered after that date.

There are no annual enrollment fees for active-duty families in either Tricare Prime or Tricare Select, but retirees will see an increase in the upcoming year.

Group A retirees enrolled in Tricare Select will see their annual enrollment fees increase from \$345 to \$355.92 for a family and from \$171.96 to \$177.96 for an individual.

Group A retirees using Tricare Prime will see the enrollment fees for a family plan increase from \$703.92 to \$726, while the single plan will go from \$351.96 to \$363 annually.

Retirees in Tricare Group B will see similar increases. Enrollment fees for a family plan will rise from \$852 to \$879, while the individual plan will go from \$426 to \$438.96.

Annual deductibles will also increase in 2024. The deductible is the amount those using Tricare Select must pay out of pocket before Tricare makes any payments.

Group A active-duty family members and retirees will see no changes to the deductible amount.

A military member with the rank of E-4 or below in Group B will see their family deductible increase from \$121 to \$125, while families with sponsors E-5 and above in Group B will see their deductible rise from \$365 to \$377.

Individual military members in Group B will also see their deductibles rise in 2024, from \$60 to \$62 for E-4 and below and from \$182 to \$188 for E-5 and above.

Most copayments also will go up in the upcoming year. Active-duty Tricare Select users with a family in Group A will see the cost of a primary care visit increase by \$2, going from \$25 to \$27. The primary care copay for Group B family members will stay at \$18.

Retirees using Tricare Select will see a primary care visit go from \$34 to \$36, while those using Tricare Prime will pay \$25 next year, up from the current \$24.

The catastrophic cap is Tricare beneficiaries' maximum out-of-pocket cost for all health care provided each year. It limits beneficiaries' liability in the case of a serious illness or injury. Once a beneficiary has paid this much in copayments or pharmacy charges during the year, Tricare will pay the rest in full. Group A retirees using Tricare Select will see this cap increase in 2024 from \$4,028 to \$4,157. While the cap for active-duty family members in Group A who have either Tricare Select or Tricare Prime will remain the same at \$1,000 annually, those in Group B will see it increase from \$1,217 to \$1,256.



A GOOD SOLDIER and The Rest of the Story

The boy had fallen, running home after school, and skinned his left knee. It was no more than a scratch - there wasn't even a tear in his trousers - but by night the knee started to ache. Nothing much, he thought, being 13 and the sturdy son of a frontiersman. Ignoring the pain, he knelt in his nightgown and said his prayers, then climbed into bed in the room where he and his five brothers slept.

His leg was painful the next morning, but he still did not tell anyone. The farm kept the whole family relentlessly busy; always he had to be up at six to do his chores before school. while father and mother stayed on for church service. But by the time dinner was ready, the boy had climbed into bed. The shoe had to be cut off his swollen and discolored leg. Why on earth hadn't he told somebody? Go quick and fetch the doctor!

Mother bathed the knee and foot and thigh, applied poultices and wiped the boy's sweating forehead with a moist, cool cloth. She was an intense and vital woman. Confronted with this angry infection, she remained serene. Mom had nursed her brood through accidents and ailments from toothaches to scarlet fever; one son she had lost, but that only made her calmer and more determined when she had to fight for the others.

Old Doc Conklin examined the leg and pursed his lips. "It's not likely we can save it!"

The invalid sat up stiffly. "What's that mean?" he asked huskily.

"It means," explained the doctor gently, "if things get worse we'll have to amputate."

"Not me!" stormed the boy. "I won't have it! I'd rather die!"

"The longer we wait, the more we will have to take off," urged the doctor.

"You won't take any off!" The boy's voice broke with an adolescent crack, as

his mother turned away, shaken. But there was no adolescence in the eyes that defied the doctor's reproachful gaze. Dr. Conklin stalked out, nodding to the mother to follow him. During this battle, 600 Marines stormed the city of Derna to rescue the crew of the USS Philadelphia from pirates.

California has a veteran population of about 1.7 million prior service members. The next highest veteran population is in Texas, with 1.5 million prior service members.

The English Bulldog, also known as "Teufel-hunden" or "Devil Dogs," is the unofficial mascot that symbolizes the ethos of the warrior culture of the U.S. Marines. The Marine Corps earned this unofficial mascot during World War I, when many German reports called the attacking Marines "teufel-hunden," meaning devil dogs. "Teufelhunden" were the vicious, wild and ferocious mountain dogs of German Bavarian folklore.

VIETNAM WOMEN'S MEMORIAL

"That my hands can shape the clay which might touch the hearts and heal the wounds of those who served fills me with humility and deep satisfaction. I can only hope that future generations who view the sculpture will stand in tribute to these women who served during the Vietnam era."

- Glenna Goodacre, sculptor of the Vietnam Women's Memorial, 1993 The healing sculptor Glenna Goodacre envisioned came to fruition.

Thirty years have passed since the memorial was dedicated.

Today, the memorial is seen by over 4 million visitors a year. It has come to stand as more than a bronze statue to salute the more than 265,000 women who served as members of the U.S. Armed Forces during the Vietnam War; it is regarded as a milestone in the journey for all women veterans, as well as those now serving, and others – like volunteers with the Red Cross and the USO – who provided support for U.S. military operations throughout the war.

Veterans Day commemorations on the National Mall on November 10 and 11 were divided into three segments: the annual candlelight gathering at the Vietnam Women's Memorial on Friday night that included prayer, poetry, testimony and camaraderie; a Saturday morning storytelling session there; and the afternoon's main event, the annual Veterans Day Observance at the Wall (the Vietnam War Memorial). Carlson Evans, an American Legion member who now lives in Helena, Mont., was the keynote speaker and reflected on the road she and her fellow veterans have traveled since the idea for a women's memorial occurred to her in 1983.

She told how men and women of the Vietnam War volunteered for 10 years to raise funds, demand approval and see the project through, despite "threats and frequent warning signs that this truly was an impossible dream. The journey began smoothly until the adversaries saw we were serious and began fighting us at every step.

"Mahatma Gandhi said, 'First they ignore you.' They did. 'Then they laugh at you.' They did. 'Then they fight you.' They did. 'Then you win.' That's our 10-year story. We won."

American Legion National Vice Commander Mark Shreve of Georgia, who placed a wreath at The Wall to conclude the ceremony on Veterans Day, said the women's memorial and the Legion's support fit a long-held value of the nation's largest veterans organization: "A veteran is a veteran," he said.

No other monument of its kind stood on the National Mall prior to effort. "Our statue was a first, the first monument in the history of the United States placed on the National Mall honoring women's patriotic service," Carlson Evans told the crowd. "We made history."

Goodacre, who passed away in 2020, intentionally sculpted no unit insignia or even branch identification into the statue, which features three women and one wounded man.

"We wanted the civilian women who served in support of the armed forces to also feel that they are connected to us, as women veterans, having served wherever we got sent, and that they too are part of this statue," Carlson Evans said. "(Goodacre) wanted us to circle the statue. She wanted us to be able to walk around it and connect with each figure."

"Through Glenna's work, each of the women portrayed lives in us because we live in them.



Through this statue, we share our Vietnam experiences with others. The healing continues for all."



Congressman Raul Ruiz has authored legislation to rename the outpatient VA clinic in Palm Desert in memory of local veteran and advocate, Seymour "Sy" Kaplan. That legislation comes to fruition at the December 8th dedication of the Palm Desert, VA Clinic at 1:30 pm, when the facility will be dedicated To Sy and the community.

Sy was a decorated World War II veteran who served as the commander of the Disabled American Veterans Chapter 78 in the Coachella Valley. Sy, who also served as a member of Dr. Ruiz's Veterans Advisory Board, is credited with bringing this VA clinic to Palm Desert through his advocacy and leadership in the community. He passed away in 2019.

Dr. Ruiz's H.R. 7925 passed the House floor on November 15, 2022. He said, "I can think of no better way to honor his (Sy's) legacy than to ensure his name is forever etched into our Desert's history at a place where our veterans receive quality care". Ruiz's legislation is supported by veterans' organizations in the Coachella Valley and throughout the State of California. We see no better way of honoring this man than naming the new clinic after him". It is located on Monterey and Dinah Shore, sharing the parking lot with Costco.


Sy enlisted in the Army at age 17, and at 18 was inducted at Camp Upton, N.Y. He served as a tank commander in the 14th Armored Division until deployment to Iran/North Africa for 60 days. Next, he was sent to Tunisia at the Kasserine Pass under General George S. Patton in the 1st and 2nd Armored Divisions. He went on to Sicily and Italy where he was first wounded and was awarded his first Purple Heart. He next went to Mt. Casino, shipped on to Marseilles and was at Épernon, France location of the huge Allied Cemetery.

He was assigned to the Combat Army Engineers throughout the Battle of the Bulge. He was wounded again near Heidelberg and was awarded his second Purple Heart. He recuperated in France and then was sent home as the war ended. Additionally, Sy earned 3 Battle Stars.

The members of the community of Sun City owe a debt of gratitude to his actions, and to see his name on the new Palm Desert Veterans Outpatient Clinic will make us all proud as our veterans will reap the benefits of his kindness in the caring for their health.

Great job, Sy! We salute you!

December 21, 1945: General George S. Patton dies at the age of 60 the result of a freak car accident in Bavaria, Germany.

December 25, 1896: John Philip Sousa pens "Stars and Stripes Forever." By a 1987 Act of Congress, the song becomes the official National March.



December 27, 1917: Harlem Hellfighters, the first all-black U.S. combat unit is shipped overseas during WWI. The 369th Infantry Regiment, a part of the 15th Infantry Regiment of the New York National Guard was made up initially of 200 residents of Harlem. The 369th fought alongside the French at many locations during the war for some 191 days and gained a reputation as great fighters but at a heavy price as one-third of the unit died in combat. The French government honored them by awarding the French Croix de Guerre.

Resolved, there was Ed, standing before the sickroom door. "Guess we'll wait and see how he looks by tonight, eh, Doc?" said the father.

For two days and nights Ed stood guard, sleeping at the threshhold, not leaving even to eat. The fever mounted, and the suffering boy babbled in torment, but the older brother showed no weakening of resolve, even though the discoloration of the swollen leg was creeping toward the pelvis, just as the doctor had predicted. Ed remained firm because he had given his promise, and also because he shared the frontiersmen's horror of being less than physically perfect.

The parents knew that their son would never forgive an amputation, and Ed's attitude continued to be decisive, time after time, when the doctor returned. Once in helpless rage, Dr. Conklin shouted, "It's murder!" and slammed the front door. Nothing but a miracle could save the boy now!

Mother, father and watchful brother Ed shared the same thought, as their anxious eyes turned from the doorway. Had they forgotten their faith in the turmoil of their fears? Why, this sick boy's grandfather, that vigorous and inspiring old farmer-minister who had been leader of the River Brethren colony in Pennsylvania, had always believed in healings wrought by faith. Now, in this desperate hour, the three went to their knees at the bedside. They prayed, taking turns in leading one another. Father, mother and at last Edgar, would rise and go about the farmwork and rejoin the continual prayer. During the second night the other four brothers would join in the prayers from time to time.

The next morning, when the old doctor stopped by again, his experienced eye saw a sign. The swelling was going down! Doc Conklin closed his eyes and made a rusty prayer of his own - a prayer of thanksgiving. Even after the boy dropped into a normal sleep, one member of the family after another kept the prayer vigil.

It was nightfall again and the lamps were lighted when the boy opened his eyes. The swelling was way down now, and the discoloration had almost faded. In three weeks - pale and weak, but with eyes clear and voice strong - the boy could stand up.

And Ike Eisenhower was ready to face life.

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TWO AMAZING PLACES TO VISIT

Do you enjoy visiting military museums? Are you a fan of classic airplanes or military vehicles such as WWII tanks? WHILE YOU'RE HERE There are two museums in the Coachella Valley that are well worth your spending 2-3 hours (or more) walking through. The

> Palm Springs Air Museum and the General Patton Memorial Museum are both in our area and both top notch.

The Palm Springs Air Museum located at 745 Gene Autry Trail in Palm Springs is open from 10AM to 5PM daily. It has been in operation since 1996. There are no ropes to keep you from interacting with vintage airplanes on display, most of which are still in flying condition. There are also numerous other unique displays covering such areas as POW/MIAs and women in aviation. The main focus is on WWII aircraft, but you will find many from later eras such as Viet Nam and even the F-117 Nighthawk Stealth Fighter! A number of the aircraft and vehicles have even been used by motion picture companies in movies. On most Saturdays during the season, you may even catch an interesting talk by a knowledgeable guest speaker on subjects such as Pearl Harbor, early aircraft carriers or Vietnam (see the calendar section of the ReadBack). You even have the opportunity to fly in a "Warbird". Call 760-778-6262 or go to www.palmspringsairmuseum.org to learn more.

The General Patton Memorial Museum is located at 62510 Chiriaco Summit, east of Indio off the I-10 at exit 173. It was established in 1988 and has really been upgraded in the past 4-5 years. Well worth the drive, the museum takes you back to the lifetime of General George S. Patton focusing on WWII. It's located where the tank training site Camp Young was in the Desert Training Center during the 1940s. Outstanding and unique displays of weaponry, uniforms and vehicles. Tank rides are available here by reservation. (Yes, the kids can touch them.) Come see everything Patton. It's open from 9AM to 4:30PM daily (except Thanksgiving and Christmas). Be sure to allow 2-3 hours to walk through the area ... more if you are really a history buff. As a bonus, they have a really good moderately priced restaurant right next door. To learn more call 760-507-4143 or go to www. generalpattonmuseum.com Note: Do not confuse this museum with the General Patton Museum of Leadership at Ft Knox, Kentucky. 
