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Celebrate the community

The 2025 theme for Black History Month is "African Americans and Labor". You can celebrate by participating in Open Arms Food Pantry and Resource Center's 9th Annual Black History Month festival taking place on February 23rd 2025 in Los Angeles at West LA's Pan Pacific Park.

Black History Month — which began in 1926 as Negro History Week — is in February because it coincides with the birthdays of two important figures in the abolitionist movement: President Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass.

February 12 is the birth date of Lincoln, who signed the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863, freeing enslaved people in the Confederate states.

February 14 is the birth date that abolitionist, and orator Frederick Douglass chose for himself after escaping slavery in 1838.

EXPO 2025 UPDATE



The latest Veterans Expo planning and networking meeting was held on January 14th. There were several new organizations whose representatives attended. Current status of the event was pinpointed as well as what needs to be accomplished over the next 30-45 days to stay on track.

Exhibitors:

MELTDOWN

and The Rest of the Story

By now you know about the Pennsylvania nuclear mishap which took place March 28, 1979.

This relates to another.

The atomic reactor has gone out of control.

No one at the installation ever thought it would come to this, and as far as I know nothing quite like it has ever happened before - but the worst has happened.

Meltdown.

There is a meltdown of the reactor core.

This much is certain: The core must be disassembled before more raditiation escapes, and since the task is beyond the capability of the most sophisticated robot, *somebody* has got to get down there and do it by hand!

No one will volunteer, so someone has been chosen. **He** is **THE REST OF THE STORY**.

He is a twenty-six-year-old lieutenant in the United States Navy.

Qualifications: He is highly trained in reactor technology and nuclear physics. He was among the nuclear technicians who aided General Electric workers in the construction of a prototype plant near Knolls Atomic Power Laboratory. He has worked with and at Atomic Energy Commission headquarters in Washingoton, has high security clearance status.

He is being flown to the meltdown site.
When he gets there, he will study an exact duplicate of the reactor which has already been constructed nearby.

Working with a team of technicians, he will rehearse each tedious step of the dismantling procedure. Television cameras will monitor the moment-by-moment condition of the real reactor.

And then, accompanied by two other technicians from the team, wearing radiation-resistant clothing and armed only with the tools in his hands, he will witness a sight no man has ever seen before; a melted-down atomic reactor core.

The disassembly will be carried out in stages, each a minute and thirty seconds in duration.

In that amount of time, the lieutenant will be exposed to; will in fact absorb, the maximum allowable raditaion for a human being for an entire year!

HAILS AND FAREWELLS

Retired Maj. Nancy Leftenant-Colon, the first African American commissioned into the U.S. Army Nurse Corps after it was desegregated in the 1940s, has died at the age of 104. Leftenant-Colon died peacefully at a nursing facility in her hometown of Amityville, N.Y., on Jan. 8, 2025 her nephew, Chris Leftenant, told National Public Radio on Wednesday. "Lefty," as she was known to many, was lauded for breaking down racial barriers and for her lifelong dedication to preserving the legacy of African American military pioneers. Born on Sept. 29, 1920, near Charleston, S.C., Leftenant-Colon was one of 12 children of James and Eunice Leftenant and the granddaughter of a freed slave, according to her official biography. Her family left the Jim Crow South for Amityville in 1923. After graduating from nursing school in 1941, Leftenant-Colon attempted to join the military but was told Black nurses weren't allowed. She kept trying, and in January 1945, she was accepted into the Army Nurse Corps as a reservist with the rank of second lieutenant. Black nurses were still prohibited from joining the regular Army at the time. Her first assignment took her to Lowell General Hospital in Fort Devens, Mass., where she treated World War II casualties in the final months of the conflict. President Harry Truman signed an executive order abolishing segregation in the military in 1948. Upon hearing the news, Leftenant-Colon applied for regular Army Nurse Corps status and became the first Black woman integrated into the Corps. She was assigned at the time to the 332nd Station Medical Group at Lockbourne Army Air Base, now Rickenbacker Air Force Base, in Ohio. It was the same base where the Tuskegee Airmen, a group of primarily African American military pilots and service members who fought in World War II, were stationed. Leftenant-Colon chose to transfer to the Air Force when the service split from the Army after the war. She was deployed overseas during the Korean and Vietnam wars. In addition to helping set up field hospitals in war zones, she was a flight nurse on the first medical evacuation flight during the battle of Dien Bien Phu in Vietnam, according to her biography on the Tuskegee Airmen website. Leftenant-Colon's final assignment was to McGuire Air Force Base, N.J., where she retired as chief nurse in 1965. "This is what I wanted, and this is what I went after," Leftenant-Colon said of her career in a 2023 interview with CBS.

Mr. Willard's Closet...THE NEED

Mr.Willard's Closet started its 3rd year in January. It's open 2 days a month and has been available for more than 50 days and met the needs of veterans primarily as a service to Veterans Village. 2025 marks a cross road for this valuable resource with a number of actions to consider over the next couple of months when determining how and whether to continue.

- 1. How is it to be funded? It doesn't cost too much since most items come from donations or other thrift shops who we share a reciprocity agreement with. That's a pretty nebulous thing to say, but every day is different, every week is different, every month is different. And, to meet special needs other items are sometimes purchased new. If Salvation Army ends up manning it, the cost for the staff time needs to be factored in.
- 2. Who will man it during the hours it's open and clean and stock it in between? Currently, Deanna Young does most all this work with a few seasonal and loyal volunteers but the day is approaching when she will not be able to do that. For example. Mr. Willard's will be closed the month of April.

We need a steady and reliable lead and a small group of people to take this on. It is currently stocked based on Deanna's understanding of the needs of the Veterans Village population and others who use the facility, after more than two years of interaction. That includes responding to special needs as they occur.

- 3. Who will manage it when the above volunteers are not on property at the Salvation Army? Currently the Cathedral City Salvation Army does not have the staff or position allocated to do this. Someone needs to control access and its use during these times.
- 4. How exactly should Mr. Willard's Closet be advertised and used? Should it be open to all veterans as it is now? Open to just Veterans Village Veterans? Open to Veterans and "selected" other needy individuals as determined by the Salvation Army Corps? Shared with veterans who are known by police and fire organizations? How do we best get the word out to those who need it most so they will take advantage of the services?

These are just a few of the questions that need to be addressed in the next 30-60 days. We welcome our readers' thoughts and comments. ReadBack.VEAP@gmail.com



MILITARY HISTORY





February 2, 1901: The United States Army Nurse Corps is established under the Army Reorganization Act.



February 4, 1945: The Yalta Conference commences. Franklin Roosevelt, Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin met at Yalta in the Crimea to address the redistribution of power and influence in the post WWII world. Part of the outcome was the division of Germany. Many believe that decisions made at this time in history led to the Cold War.



February 9, 1942: Daylight Savings Time is instituted (WWII played a big role in this decision).



February 14, 1914: Hannah "Nancy" Harkness Love, one of the first female pilots in the U.S. military is born. Google her name and learn her fascinating story.



February 15, 1898: The battleship, USS Maine explodes in Havana, Cuba harbor sinking and killing 260 crew members. Led to Spanish American War famous for Teddy Roosevelt's Rough Riders. The Maine was a 6682-ton second class battleship built in the New York Navy yard and commissioned in 1895.



February 20, 1942: Naval Officer Edward O'Hare becomes the first American WWII flying ace. O'Hare destroyed 5 Japanese G4M1 Betty bombers. Lt Commander O'Hare disappeared and was presumed shot down on November 26, 1943 while participating in one of the first nighttime fighter plane launches from an aircraft carrier. In 1944, he was officially declared dead. The airport in Chicago was named after him in 1949. He was also a recipient of the Medal of Honor (posthumously).



February 22, 1942: President Roosevelt tells General MacArthur to leave the Philippines.



February 24, 1991: The Gulf War ground offensive begins. A large coalition of ground forces moved into Iraq as part of Operation Desert Storm.



February 26, 2017: U.S. drone strike kills Osama Bin Laden's son-in-law.



February 28, 1991: Coalition Forces enter Kuwait City, collapsing Iraq resistance. Operation Desert Sabre, a massive allied ground offensive came to an end after Iraq stopped its resistance and President George H. W. Bush declared a cease-fire. On February 24th, coalition forces from 34 countries had begun Desert Sabre which lasted just 4 days. As a part f the peace negotiated between the U.N. and Iraq, Iraq recognized Kuwait's sovereignty and agreed to divest itself of all weapons of mass destruction.

Jack was on the USS Devilfish. Devilfish was the only submarine ever struck by a kamikaze plane...while submerged! When asked, Jack told stories of being on torpedo tube cleaning duty. Jack was small enough to be put into the tube with a rope attached to his ankles. He would climb to the end of the tube, cleaning backward until he was pulled out by his feet.

Amazing discoveries...all through watching the Gallery of Heroes presentation.

He did risk his life, and then he lived to be 100. In fact he became the President of the United States, Jimmy Carter.

Why We Remember THE FOUR CHAPLAINS ON FEBRUARY 3rd

Through the night of **February 2, 1943**, the S.S. Dorchester was traveling from New York to Great Britain. Once a luxury coastal liner, the 5,649-ton vessel had been converted into an Army transport ship, and was crowded to capacity, carrying 902 servicemen, merchant seamen, and civilian workers.

That evening, the captain ordered the men to sleep in their clothing and keep life jackets on. Many soldiers, deep in the ship's hold, disregarded the order because of the engine's heat. Others ignored it because the life jackets were uncomfortable.

On Feb. 3, at 12:55 a.m., a German submarine U-223 spotted the ship and its convoy. They fired a torpedo that would sink the boat in under 30 minutes.

Aboard the Dorchester, panic and chaos had set in. The blast had killed scores of men, and many more were seriously wounded. Loss of power from the blast prevented the crew from sending a radio distress signal, and no rockets or flares were launched to alert the escorts. Many passengers were disoriented in the darkness.

Passengers quickly began to overcrowd lifeboats to the point of capsizing, according to eyewitnesses. Other rafts, tossed into the Atlantic, drifted away before soldiers could get in them.

In the midst of this pandemonium, four Army chaplains joined together to bring faith, and hope to a desperate situation. Those chaplains were Methodist Minister Lt. George L. Fox, Rabbi Lt. Alexander D. Goode, Catholic Priest Lt. John P. Washington, and Dutch Reformed Church Minister Lt. Clark V. Poling.

Quickly and quietly, the four men spread out among the soldiers, working to calm the frightened, tend the wounded and guide the disoriented toward safety.

"Witnesses of that terrible night remember hearing the four men offer prayers for the dying and encouragement for those who would live," remembered Wyatt R. Fox, son of Reverend Fox.

One witness, Private William B. Bednar, found himself floating in oil-smeared water surrounded by dead bodies and debris. "I could hear men crying,

pleading, praying," Bednar recalls. "I could also hear the chaplains preaching courage. Their voices were the only thing that kept me going."

As the ship sank and most of the remaining passengers were topside, the chaplains opened a storage locker and began distributing life jackets. When there were no more lifejackets in the storage room, the chaplains removed theirs and gave them to four frightened young men.

"It was the finest thing I have seen or hope to see this side of heaven," said John Ladd, another survivor who witnessed this selfless act.

As the ship went down, survivors in nearby rafts could see the four chaplains—arms linked and braced against the slanting deck. Their voices could also be heard offering prayers.

Of the 902 men aboard the S.S. Dorchester, only 230 survived. When the news reached American shores, the nation was stunned by the magnitude of the tragedy and heroic conduct of the four chaplains.

That night Reverend Fox, Rabbi Goode, Reverend Poling and Father Washington became an enduring example of extraordinary faith, courage and selflessness.

Lt. Gen. Brehon B. Somervell, Commanding General of the Army Service Forces posthumously awarded the men the Distinguished Service Cross and Purple Heart on December 19, 1944 in a ceremony at the post chapel at Fort Myer, VA.

A one-time only posthumous Special Medal for Heroism was authorized by Congress and awarded by President Eisenhower on January 18, 1961. The special medal was intended to have the same weight and importance as the Medal of Honor.

Today, 82 years after the Dorchester sunk beneath the ocean surface, the story of these four men inspire people to serve and support one another regardless of their faith or religious affiliation.

Expanding Our Team

We are pleased to announce the recent hiring of a Housing Coordinator, who will focus on supporting efforts to assist homeless veterans in securing stable housing and accessing critical resources. This new role is a significant step forward in addressing homelessness among our veteran population.

Additionally, we are in the process of hiring Community Liaisons who will provide case management support to justice-involved veterans. These liaisons will play a key role in helping veterans navigate the challenges of reintegration and connecting them with services such as mental health care, employment opportunities, and VA claims assistance.

We are also in the hiring phase for our third Veterans Service Representative (VSR) for District 4. Once hired, this representative will undergo comprehensive training and certification through

the California Department of Veterans Affairs (CDVA), a process that takes approximately 7 to 9 months. Our current team includes two representatives, one of whom is still completing training and certification.

Planning for Growth

To better accommodate the growing demand for services, we are actively searching for a new location for our District 4 branch. A larger and more accessible facility will enable us to serve veterans and their families more effectively while creating a welcoming environment for all.

Continuing Our Mission

Even as we expand and transition, our dedication to serving veterans remains steadfast. From assisting with VA claims to providing vital resources and support, our team is here to meet the needs of the community.

We thank you for your patience and support as we grow to better serve District 4. These changes are an investment in the future of our veteran community, and we are excited to share more updates as we make progress.

Here is a brief outline of who they are, what they stand for and all the many wonderful opportunities that membership in the local chapter entails.

The Air and Space Forces Association's mission is to promote U.S. and Space Forces as the foundation of a strong National Defense; to honor and support our Airmen, Guardians and their Families and to remember and respect their enduring heritage. Unlock Your Health Through the MHS Nurse Advice

Do you know what to do when you or a family member feels sick, but it's outside of business hours or it's the weekend? Should you go to an urgent care clinic or the emergency room, or wait until your doctor's office is open? Luckily, TRICARE has a service called the Military Health System Nurse Advice Line that can help when you need healthcare guidance.

"The MHS Nurse Advice Line is an excellent resource for TRICARE beneficiaries and their families "Sometimes all you might need is to have a healthcare professional answer a few simple questions to provide you with direction and next steps. By contacting the MHS Nurse Advice Line, you'll have peace of mind."

What's the MHS Nurse Advice Line?

The MHS Nurse Advice Line lets you connect with a registered nurse by phone, chat, or video. It's available 24/7 and free for TRICARE beneficiaries to use. Registered nurses are available to answer your questions and give you advice. They can help when you're feeling sick, worried about what medicine to take for your symptoms, or not sure if you should seek medical care.

Who can use the MHS Nurse Advice Line?

If you live in the U.S. or in a country outside the U.S. with a military hospital or clinic, you can use the MHS Nurse Advice Line. This includes:

- Active duty service members and their family members
- Retirees and their family members

Note: You can use the MHS Nurse Advice Line unless you're enrolled in the US Family Health Plan, which has its own nurse advice line.

It's important that the sponsor's and family members' personal information is up to date in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System. Log in via milConnect to check this information.

The MHS Nurse Advice Line can help in many situations. Your nurse can:

Answer your healthcare questions.

Assess your symptoms and give recommendations for the most appropriate steps to take next.

Give instructions to treat minor issues at home.

Help you find the closest urgent care or emergency care facility, if needed.

Help you make an appointment at your military hospital or clinic, if needed.

Give you an online "absence excuse" or "sick slip" when medically appropriate (subject to service command requirements).

Keep in mind that the MHS Nurse Advice Line isn't for emergency situations. Health emergencies are conditions that threaten your life, limb, eyesight, or safety. Are you a Veteran who served at least two periods of service? In other words, did you reenlist? If so, there's a chance that you're eligible for additional G.I. Bill benefits. To receive an expiration date extension, applications must be submitted by Oct. 1, 2030.

Do I need to do anything?

Of the 1.04 million Veterans who may potentially be eligible for additional benefits, VA will be able to automatically adjudicate the claims for approximately 660,000 without any further action required on their part. For all remaining Veterans, VA will be reaching out to them directly to encourage them to file a claim.






