VA CUTS



The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has confirmed that more than 1,000 staff members have been let go as part of President Donald Trump's wide-ranging purge of federal bureaucracy, prompting concern that benefits could be impacted by lower staffing levels.

There are some 6.2 million veterans in the United States who receive disability benefits from the VA.

The dismissals have prompted the VA to issue a message to quell concerns that benefits for veterans may be cut.

Compensation offers tax-free monthly benefits for those with disabilities resulting from diseases, events, or injuries sustained or worsened during active military service, and benefits are also offered to surviving members of deceased veterans' families.

Secretary of Veterans Affairs Doug Collins, who was confirmed by the Senate to lead the agency earlier this month, has said that VA benefits will not be cut despite the staffing cull.

"I'm the Secretary of VA, and I'm telling you right now, that's not happening ... the reality is, veterans benefits aren't getting cut," Collins said. "In fact, we are actually giving and improving services."

The VA has confirmed that "mission-critical" positions—including those involved in the administration of benefits—are not being eliminated

In a press release issued on February 13, the VA said the dismissals "are part of a government-wide Trump Administration effort to make agencies more efficient, effective and responsive." This will allow the VA to focus "on its core mission: providing the best possible care and benefits to Veterans, their families, caregivers and survivors."

Since the announcement, there has been considerable opposition to the staffing reduction. Democratic lawmakers, along with union leaders and concerned veterans, gathered outside the VA offices in Washington, D.C., this week.

VA Secretary Doug Collins said in a press release issued on February 13: "At VA, we are focused on saving money so it can be better spent on Veteran care. We thank these employees for their service to VA. This was a tough decision, but ultimately it's the right call to better support the Veterans, families, caregivers, and survivors the department exists to serve.



ONE OF THE LAST US SURVIVORS OF PEARL HARBOR DIES AT 102

Jessie A. Mahaffey, one of the last remaining survivors of the sinking of the USS Oklahoma during the 1941 Japanese surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, died March 1 in Alexandria, La. He was 102.

The Oklahoma capsized and sank within minutes of the Sunday morning attack, killing 429 crew members. With Mahaffey's death, only two survivors of the Oklahoma are known to be living, according to a tally maintained by Kathleen Farley, president of the California chapter of Sons and Daughters of Pearl Harbor Survivors. By that same tally, only 14 veterans who survived the 1941 Pearl Harbor attack are still alive.

Jessie Alton Mahaffey was born Nov. 23, 1922, in Florien, La., according to an obituary posted online by Warren Meadows Funeral Home in Many, La. Mahaffey joined the Navy in the summer of 1941 after graduating high school in Louisiana. After attending boot camp in San Diego, he was assigned to the Oklahoma. On the morning of the attack, he was preparing for an inspection when Japanese torpedo bombers attacked the Oklahoma, he told KTBS-TV in Shreveport in a Dec. 7 interview. He and five other sailors were scrubbing the battleship's wooden deck using abrasive holystones attached to broomsticks, he said. "It was a quiet Sunday, and we had the day off except for the yearly admiral inspection," he told the TV station. "Then we heard a siren, saw planes and smoke. It must have only gone on for 45 minutes, but it was crazy." Japanese planes immediately targeted the Oklahoma, and it was struck by three torpedoes within 10 minutes. As it began to capsize, two more torpedoes slammed into it, and crew members were strafed as they abandoned ship. "It turned upside down and we had to slide over the bottom of the ship into the water, he recollected in the interview. He swam to and boarded the USS Maryland, which was moored beside the Oklahoma.

Mahaffey was later assigned to the cruiser USS Northampton, and cheated death when it was sunk Nov. 30, 1942, during the Battle of Tassafaronga in the Solomon Islands. The Northampton was part of a cruiser-destroyer force tasked with preventing Japanese reinforcements from reaching Guadalcanal. Two Japanese torpedoes ripped open the Northampton, and within three hours the crew was forced to abandon the sinking ship. "The ship was sunk at midnight, and we had to stay on rafts the whole night," he said in the interview. Mahaffey left the Navy when the war ended in 1945, returning to Louisianna where he worked for the phone company for 30 years. He was preceded in death by his wife, Joyce, and is survived by two sons. Source - Stars and Stripes

A GRANT OF SUICIDE And

The Rest of the Story

The Grant administration was widely believed, especially in Democratic circles, to have been a corrupt one. And while Grant initially aimed to establish a peaceful policy with Native American tribes, including the Sioux, through his "Peace Policy," this ultimately failed due to the discovery of gold in the Black Hills, leading to increased conflict and forced removal of the Sioux from their land, with Grant's administration approving military action to seize the territory which ultimately led to the Great Sioux War of 1876.

By spring of 1876 "Get-Grant" fever had spilled from the Hill into the heartland. But congressional investigators needed something substantial with which to nail the president. They would begin with grand-scale graft in the War Department. They would get to Grant through his suspect secretary of war, William Belknap.

Under Belknap, soldiers at army posts could no longer purchase nonmilitary supplies from whomever they wished. Beginning June 1870, they could make such purchases only from merchants chosen and licensed by the War Department. Rumor had it, those army-post merchants, called "sutlers," were paying up to four-fifths of their annual income to War Department officials. Some said, to Secretary Belknap himself!

It would take more than hearsay to expose Belknap, however.

One man came forward.

He was a soldier named George from Fort Abraham Lincoln in the Dakota Territory.

He testified before a number of congressional committees. Yes, he believed Belknap was a crook. Then he, George, produced certain documents to support his contention. He even linked Orvil Grant, the president's own brother, to Belknap's alleged indiscretions.

Before the congressional investigation was over, William Belknap resigned as secretary of war.

TaxSlayer has a military deal that allows active-duty military to e-file a federal return for free. Keep in mind that state returns are additional.

At **TaxAct**, active-duty military can file federal and state returns for free, plus get free expert assistance. The offer is applied when an eligible Employer ID Number is entered during filing.

The Army & Air Force Exchange Service is working with **H&R Block** to provide tax preparation services to military members at a 10% discount at select Exchange locations around the world through March 21, 2025.

If you're a USAA member, enlisted members can use **TurboTax** Online and file taxes for free, and officers can file for free before Feb. 28, 2025. All USAA members save 20% when filing their federal tax returns with TurboTax.

Military OneSource provides military members free tax consultations and tax preparation and filing services through **MilTax**. This includes tax preparation and e-filing software, support from tax consultants and current information about filing taxes in the military. MilTax e-filing software is available from mid-January through mid-October.

With **IRS Free File Software**, you can prepare and file your federal individual income tax return for free using tax preparation and filing software. If your adjusted gross income (AGI) is below \$84,000, you can file your taxes with free software and find free state return options. Use free file fillable forms if your income is greater than \$84,000.

MILITARY HISTORY



April 4. 1949: The foreign ministries of twelve countries sign the North Atlantic Treaty establishing the organization NATO. NATO was the first peacetime military alliance for the United States. It was formed to deter Soviet expansion, forbid a revival of national militarism in Europe and encourage European political integration. Article 5 of the treaty forcibly stated that the participating nations agreed to "an armed attack against one or more of them shall constitute an attack against them all."

April 6. 1917: America joins in World War I. Congress votes in favor of President Woodrow Wilson's request for a declaration of war against Germany. Although Europeans had been engaged in battle since July 1914, the United States had tried to remain neutral. More than two million U.S. soldiers fought between April 1917 and November 1918. One outcome from the war was that many women worked on the home front during the war and this increased the call for women's rights, in particular, the right to vote and led to the passing of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution in 1920.

April 9, 1865: Confederate General Robert E. Lee surrenders to General Crant at Appomattox Court House, Virginia ending the Civil War.

April 14, 1865: President Abraham Lincoln is shot at Ford's Theater in Washington, OC by John Wilkes Booth and dies the following morning.

Congress Considers Changes to VA Home Loan Program

The House Committee on Veterans' Affairs Subcommittee on Economic Opportunity recently reviewed legislative proposals to strengthen the VA Home Loan Program. A primary focus was the "Restoring the VA Home Loan Program in Perpetuity Act," introduced by Chairman Mike Bost (R-IL), which seeks to limit the number of direct loans the VA can repurchase. This proposal is intended to reduce the financial risks posed by the VA Service Purchase Program, VASP, which allows the VA to acquire and modify delinquent loans. Bost argues that VASP, if left unchanged, could undermine the program's future viability.

"This legislation would limit the number of direct loans VA is authorized to purchase back to what VA had traditionally done before the creation of the VA Service Purchase Program," says Bost. "I believe that if we don't change VASP, this program will continue to be a trojan horse on VA's books that could ruin the VA home loan program forever."

Bost, a Veteran who has used the VA Home Loan Program multiple times, says the program must remain available for future generations. He advocates for a permanent partial claim option to help struggling borrowers defer missed payments without facing immediate foreclosure. This provision would align the VA Home Loan Program with similar relief programs under FHA, Fannie Mae, and Freddie Mac, allowing Veterans to recover financially while maintaining homeownership.

The proposed legislation draws mixed reactions. Elizabeth Balce of Carrington Mortgage Services, representing the Mortgage Bankers Association, MBA, expresses concerns that capping VA loan repurchases could restrict critical assistance for Veterans. Balce supports the introduction of a partial claim program but criticizes elements of the bill that could reduce its effectiveness. She argues that deducting a partial claim from the VA's 25%

loan guaranty increases risks for lenders, making VA loans less attractive and potentially limiting Veterans' access to these benefits.

Additionally, Balce opposes the bill's requirement that Veterans begin repaying their partial claims within three years to maintain a 0% interest rate. After three years, the balance accrues interest at 0.5%, a provision she describes as burdensome and inconsistent with other government-backed programs. She also raises concerns about the bill's sunset date of September 30, 2027, arguing that a longer time frame, such as five years, would provide more meaningful assistance.

While the legislation intends to protect the program's financial stability, critics warn that restricting VA's ability to repurchase loans may harm Veterans by reducing available mortgage options. Balce urges lawmakers to strengthen loss mitigation tools, such as a permanent partial claim, rather than impose arbitrary caps. The MBA also urges Congress to stop using the VA funding fee as a budget offset, stressing that it should remain dedicated to supporting the home loan program's mission.

Lawmakers continue to debate the best approach to balancing financial responsibility with ensuring long-term support for Veterans seeking homeownership.

US MILITARY VETERANS RESCUE AMERICAN FAMILY AMID ESCALATING VIOLENCE IN HAITI

Founded in the wake of the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan, **Project DYNAMO** Founded in the wake of the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan, **Project DYNAMO** brings together American military veterans and veterans of the intelligence services to rescue U.S. nationals from overseas in the "gray space," where official channels cannot function freely.

"In a perfect world, there shouldn't be a need for Project DYNAMO, but the simple fact is that the world has become more globalized," said Mario Duarte, president and CEO of Project DYNAMO and former soldier in the U.S. Army and Army Reserve. "The embassies, as we are seeing firsthand, are not always able, capable or legally allowed to help."

As a fully donor-funded organization, Project DYNAMO is able to clear bureaucratic hurdles that NGOs, which receive U.S. government funding, cannot.

"We have a smaller chain of command so we can make decisions immediately — 'OK, we're gonna go get those people," said James Judge, a Coast Guard veteran who acted as team leader in the effort to rescue Ennis, his wife, Mica, and their daughter, Niah.

Despite the limited operations of the U.S. Embassy in Haiti and the closure of the Port au Prince airport, the Project DYNAMO team was able to fly from Miami to a small airport in Cap Haitien. From there, they took a private helicopter into the missionary compound in Saint-Marc and performed a hard extraction. They loaded the family onto a fixed wing aircraft to an undisclosed third country, finally landing in the Dominican Republic.

With the assistance of Sen. Ted Cruz and the government of the Dominican Republic, Project DYNAMO was able to secure safe passage for the Ennis family back to Zach's home in Conroe, Texas.

If Dianne Ennis had never seen Project DYNAMO mentioned in a Facebook group for missionaries, it's unclear when she might have met her new granddaughter.

"She's a gorgeous little princess," Duarte said of 5-month-old Niah. "We've been to different embassies, and everyone wants to be her friend."

Duarte is proud of the work Project DYNAMO does to rescue people like the Ennis family from war and combat zones.

"There are Americans all over the world," he said, "and at some point, they need help."

Social Security Announces Options to its Workforce

The following message was sent to agency employees Feb 27:

The Social Security Administration (SSA) will soon implement agency-wide organizational restructuring that will include significant workforce reductions. Through these massive reorganizations, offices that perform functions not mandated by statute may be prioritized for reduction-in-force actions that could include abolishment of organizations and positions, directed reassignments, and reductions in staffing. The agency may reassign employees from non-mission critical positions to mission critical direct service positions (e.g., field offices, teleservice centers, processing centers). Reassignments may be involuntary and may require retraining for new workloads.


