"They were quite the pair — she, a beautiful young girl with a bright, white smile; he, a homeless veteran with a scraggly beard and weathered face. Their friendship started out slow. The girl — who remains unidentified — began saying "hi" to Tony as she traveled to and from her workplace. Soon enough they were having small conversations and then regular talks and periodic lunches. "Tony tells me about his war stories, loved ones, and who should win the Super Bowl," she wrote in a Dec. 5, 2012, post on Reddit. "I tell Tony about my problems, loved ones, and how I don't really care who should win the Super Bowl."

From an outsider's point of view, it seemed the young girl was offering the old, lonely man an ear. But the friendship was reciprocal. Recently, the girl went through a difficult period emotionally, and Tony reportedly helped her navigate those tough personal choices. One day she was walking around feeling sorry for herself when she felt a tap on her shoulder. She turned to find Tony giving her a concerned look. He had something for her, he said. "From his army jacket, he pulls out a watch head. Tony takes my hand and gently places the broken antique in my palm." He went on to say: "I don't have much but I wanted you to know that you have done what many others would not simply by being my friend." The girl said she realized that when you extend yourself to those in need: "You get back not only what you gave, but infinitely more," she wrote."

Beyond the 12th Annual Veterans and Community Expo

And just like that... around 2pm on April 5, some 500 people from across the Coachella Valley and beyond were gone from the 12th Annual Veterans and Community Expo.

They had all celebrated the Valley's veterans, the 29 Palms Marine Corps Marines and explored ways to better provide veterans the services they need. Four outstanding individuals were honored, two local veterans and two active duty Marines and our list of VIP guests were matched up with cadets from the Desert Hot Springs Public Safety Academy for a unique opportunity for young High School students to interact with successful leaders from across the area.

From the fly-over provided by the Palm Springs Air Museum to the Patriotic program, to lunch prepared by the Coachella Valley Rescue Mission, to the diverse group of 52 exhibitors, they experienced it all! Overall, this year's expo reaped dividends in many ways for veterans, our Marine neighbors from 29-Palms, residents from neighboring Veterans Village and the Coachella Valley.

So what's next? This event has been a one of a kind tradition for the Coachella Valley since 2010, matching the need for information and resources for our veterans. It started with a small group of 30 exhibitors and attendees at the Indio Armory that first year and led to increased attendance up to 1500 at the Riverside County Fairgrounds from 2012 to 2019. After the pandemic, it came back in 2022 in a new format at the Cathedral City Corps of the Salvation Army and has continued there drawing around 500 each year recently including a number of residents of the newly completed Veterans Village next door.

As we move into 2026 and a possible 13th Annual event, a number of questions put the future Expos in the balance. We need new leadership as Bill and Deanna Young seek to pass the baton to a new generation. We need to explore the possibility of returning to the Riverside County Fairgrounds in Indio to allow for more exhibitors, first responders, and more attendees. We need to find a way to keep this tradition going. Even in a civic sense, it gives help and honor to our American military heroes, mentors High School kids, provides an opportunity for the Valley to interact in a positive way with the Marine Base and is a unique Patriotic event that all can come together and support no matter their feelings in other areas.

Bill and Deanna would like to thank those of you who have been there with us through thick and thin, exploration and discovery....frantic times and satisfying experiences. As Albert Einstein once said, "Life is like riding a bicycle. To keep your balance, you must keep moving." The Expo has been a labor of love for us, and we will miss it in our daily lives.

The Rest of the Story

To his classmates at West Point, he was "Old Jack." To General Robert E. Lee, he was "my trusty right arm." To his troops he was "Old Blue Light" until the first battle of Bull Run. Then one of the Confederate soldiers observed that their commander, standing bravely in th heat of the fray, looked very much...like a stone wall.

That was General Thomas J. Jackson. "Stonewall" Jackson.

In the War Between the States, his brigade - the first Brigade - was perhaps the Confederacy's most devastating war machine.

He trained his men to precision; he conditioned them to the height of responsiveness; he transformed their numbers in to a cohesive organism, a virtually unconquerable instrument of war.

For the men who served under "Stonewall" Jackson, obedience was a key concept, discipline a way of life. Still, the General loved his men, and the men loved their General.

The images of the leader and the led blurred, fused, "Stonewall" Jackson and the First Brigade became an unbeatable package deal, the dread of the Union Army.

Of all the military units in the South, his was the killing machine.

It is for this reason that I wish to focus your attention on "Stonewall" Jackson's last battle, a fight both won and lost. That is THE REST OF THE STORY.

During the Civil War, the secret weapon of the Confederacy was no secret.

It was General "Stonewall" Jackson and his First Brigade. The discipline, the unflinching obedience of Jackson's men, the military brilliance of their leader, combined to comprise a most remarkable war machine. The tactical efficiency and ingenuity of Jackson's last battle was so outstanding that most modern military textbooks include a description of it.

It took place in May 1863, an encounter with Union general Joseph Hooker near Chancellorsville, Virginia.

I won't diminish the intricacy of Jackson's maneuvers by attempting to synopsize them here; but in the end, after already having divided his troops, Jackson divided them again, swung around to the right in a surprise attack and extended himself and his division beyond his own lines. They routed the enemy.

The battle had been won. And then, a tragedy for the Confederates. General "Stonewall" Jackson returning from the attack, was shot three times.

Social Security Statement on President Trump's Memorandum, "Preventing Illegal Aliens from Obtaining Social Security Act Benefits"

The Social Security Administration (SSA) today expressed its full support for President Trump's memorandum, "Preventing Illegal Aliens from Receiving Social Security Act Benefits." This memorandum reinforces SSA's commitment to safeguarding taxpayer dollars and ensuring the integrity of the programs it administers.

"The Social Security Administration is dedicated to protecting the vital benefits that American workers have earned on behalf of themselves and their families," said Acting Commissioner Leland Dudek. "We are committed to working diligently to implement the President's memorandum and to ensure that benefits are paid only to those who should receive them."

The President's memorandum directs SSA to take several key actions aimed at stopping illegal aliens and other ineligible people from obtaining benefits under the Social Security Act. They include:

- Expanding SSA's fraud prosecutor programs;
- Investigating earnings reports of people 100 years old or older with mismatched records;
- Considering reinstatement of SSA's civil monetary penalty program; and
- Reinforcing program integrity measures so that only noncitizens who meet all eligibility requirements can receive benefits.

SSA administers three essential programs under the Social Security Act that support the financial well-being of over 70 million individuals. The Old-Age and Survivors Insurance (OASI) program, established in 1935, provides retirement and survivors benefits, paying over \$1.3 trillion in fiscal year (FY) 2024 to approximately 59 million beneficiaries monthly. The Disability Insurance (DI) program, established in 1956, offers benefits to disabled workers and their families, issuing about \$157 billion in FY 2024 to over 8 million beneficiaries each month. The Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, created in 1972, supports aged, blind, and disabled individuals with limited income, issuing around \$56 billion in payments to 7.4 million recipients monthly, with some also receiving OASI or DI benefits. Additionally, the agency supports various national programs administered by other federal and state agencies including Medicare and Medicaid, among others.

REAL ID NOW

Starting May 7, 2025, you will need a REAL ID or a valid passport to board domestic flights, board ships or to enter federal buildings.

If you still need a REAL ID, here's what to do:

Start your application online at REALID.dmv.ca.gov

Gather your documents: proof of identity, proof of Social Security number, and two proofs of California residency

Visit a DMV office to complete the process

Appointments are filling up, so plan ahead and get it done early.

MILITARY HISTORY

May 1, 2011: U.S. Special Forces kill Osama bin Laden. Twenty-six Navy SEALs in two Blackhawk helicopters raided Osama bin Laden's compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan. President Barrack Obama gave order on April 29th for the group to attack the compound. The conflict took 40 minutes and bin Laden was killed during the final 5-10 minutes of the fight.

May 7, 1937: Aviator sunglasses are first made available to the general public.

May 12, 2018: Four Korean War veterans unveiled a 1,000 pound statue of U.S. Marine horse Sergeant Reckless at Kentucky Horse Park in Lexington. In 1952, a group of U.S. Marines had bought Reckless from a stable boy in Seoul and trained her as a pack horse for their unit. In March 1953, during the Battle of Outpost Vegas, Reckless carried over 9,000 pounds of ammunition over 50 trips to shooting sites despite being wounded twice. She was awarded 2 Purple Hearts for her service.

May 13, 1908: The U.S. Navy Nurse Corps is established.

May 18, 1917: The Selective Service Act is passed. By the end of WWI nearly 24 million men were registered and 2.8 million were officially drafted.

May 19, 1943: Churchill and FDR plot D-Day.

May 23, 2005: The United States announced the U.S – Afghanistan Strategic Partnership as a part of the War on Terror.

May 26, 1972: President Richard Nixon and General Secretary of the Communist Party, Leonid Brezhnev sign the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT). Among the issues discussed were the Vietnam War, the situation in the Middle East, Nuclear arms race and the foundation for a joint space flight program.

May 26, 2025: Memorial Day celebrated. It's now celebrated on the last Monday of the month of May and was first observed as Decoration Day in 1868 following the Civil War. The holiday honors and mourns all the U.S. military personnel who died while serving in the U.S. Armed Forces. Memorial Day officially became a Federal Holiday in 1971.

May 28, 1863: The 54th Massachusetts Infantry, one of the most famous African American Regiments of the Civil War left Boston for combat in the South.

Palm Springs Chapter of the Air and Space Forces (AFSA) Summer Schedule Even as we approach the summer season and a traditionally slower schedule for Coachella Valley organizations, the Palm Springs AFSA has a lot going on May through August before we ramp things up in September.

On April 3rd, 22 Cyber Patriot student competitors, 3 teachers and 2 ASFA sponsors enjoyed a field trip to Acrisure Arena. Acrisure Host, Chase Schulenburg coordinated the visit focusing on IT, Security and Sports Management Career opportunities. AFSA organized the trip and provided a pizza lunch in a 2nd Deck Executive lounge area.

Annually, we select a Teacher of the Year and present the winner with that award while nominating them for the California State award. Our past two local winners both won at the state level and moved forward on to the national level. Twenty five to thirty students from across the Valley are expected to attend. Classes will be daily from 9AM to 1PM. This is a great lead-in for students hoping to compete in the 2nd annual Coachella Valley Cyber Challenge staring in the Fall.

Regular meetings for the Palm Springs chapter of the AFSA are held on the first Thursday of each month at the Palm Springs Air Museum (PSAM). Normally these meetings include a special guest speaker. There are also informal monthly "Air Commando" get-togethers at Roc's Firehouse that can also include a special guest speaker. There will be no PSAM meetings in July or August, but they will start up again on September 4th.

Considering the morale of his men to the last, he had requested that his wounds be kept secret.


But the troops knew all along.


Among the strict orders he had issued to his brigade before the battle was immediately to gun down any unknown soldiers, and to ask questions later.

That is why Jackson's men, ever obedient, conditioned to react quickly, responded to the rustling in the dense woods of Chancellorsville by opening fire.

The "unknown soldier" they felled was their own General, "Stonewall" Jackson, returning from that daring foray beyond his own lines!

In the end, the unstoppable First Brigade - the Confederacy's most magnificent killing machine - had not broken down, but had merely turned on itself. Now you know the Rest of the Story.

What is Veteran Directed Care?


